## EDITORIAL

Half-way through the season and still top of the League yet what does the next few weeks have in store? We've had amazing fortune this season in obtaining home draws in the cup competitions and following home ties with Yeovil (in the A C Delco) and Leatherhead (in the F A Trophy) we now have the prospect of a home tie with Windsor or Wantage in the Berks & Bucks Senior Cup Second Round. Going back to the Trophy match with Leatherhead, would I be tempting fate by saying that we've never lost a First Round Trophy Tie?

On the 27th December we carry on our League campaign with a home match with Kingstonian. Having now completed eleven consecutive victories in the league, a win for Wycombe would set a new Club record of consecutive League wins.

We complete the seasonal fixtures with visits to Windsor and then Croydon. This season's 'whipping boys', Walthamstow Avenue, visit Loakes Park on January 10 (still no wins yet for Avenue). Seven days later we make a mega journey (by VOL standards) to the sunny climes of Bognor Regis. Bognor are currently unbeaten at home, although so were Slough, Bishop's Stortford and Barking. Remember, Bognor have Josef Blochel on their books. On the 24th January we are due to play Bromley at Loakes Park but that is Trophy Second Round day (no further comment). The final day of the month has 'The Blues' making their first visit to St Albans City since 1973.

As a matter of interest, at the half-way stage last season in the VOL Sutton were top with 44 points with Yeovil 5 points behind and Farnborough in third with 37 points.

## FROM THE TERRACES by Simon Burrage.

The Power of the Press! One little joke about Mark West's form in our last edition and he was promptly dropped from the team! (As if Alan Gane would be caught reading a rag like this). Westie would probably be the first to admit that he hadn't been performing as he is capable so far this season. Nevertheless, anyone who scores goals as regularly as Westie has been, will always be worth a place in the side - but of course, if the supply of goals dries up, however briefly, the pressure grows and there is great competition for places in the line-up. Alan Gane inevitably received some criticism for dropping the League's leading goalscorer but people are finding it increasingly difficult to question AG's decisions when they are producing the kind of consistently excellent results that we have enjoyed recently. For example, releasing Barry 'The Suit' Silkman was a surprise but has he been missed? Andy Graham had been struggling to make any impression when given the chance to play up front earlier in the season, and Jason Seacole had been a little dissapointing in midfield. To simply swap the two around - Graham to midfield and Seacole forward - looked a curious move at first but soon proved to be an inspired idea, with both players turning in some impressive displays in their new roles and Andy "do you think I look like Robert Smith(\*)" Graham hitting the net with some regularity from his deeper position.

Seeing as I'm on the subject of goalscorers, let me mention that hallowed name - DECLAN LINK. We've all read the BFP's recent attempts of (idle?) speculation, but speculation or not, this is a very important issue. Alan Gane, I hope, and believe, will be well aware of it's significance. Personally, I don't much like reading the BFP's suggestions that it would be quite nice to have Declan back at Wycombe. It would be more accurate to say that it could be a tragic, long-term disaster for us NOT to have him back. Sure, he may be tempted to renew his partnership and friendship with Simon Read, even at Farnborough, but Wycombe Wanderers F C NEEDS him if it has serious ambition and must do everything possible in its power - and that means financially, if necessary - to turn his head this way. What we are all looking for is a team which will not only succeed in getting out of the VOL but also succeed in the GMVC. To recapture Declan's services would be a massive step towards building such a team. And after all, whatever kind of offer may be required, would it not be a worthwhile investment if he were to sign a full contract for WWFC, thus ensuring that any subsequent transfer would pay handsomely? When he left the Club last November he was probably already worth about £10,000 on the open market; 22 years old and a proven goalscorer in the Gola League. We gained no transfer fee for him when he left - and more is required now.

Our lowest point in November was of course the Yeovil debacle in the new GMAC Cup, a result which automatically means the GMAC was not worth bothering with anyway (!) I wonder if I'll be thinking the same about the A C Delco Cup after they've visited us again on December 16 ?! In the light of the two results we have already had against our tractor-driving yokel friends from Somerset one is tempted to make some cheap remark about our respective league positions but I think I'll wait until next April before daring to break into any rash optimism about that. Speaking of breaking things - will Tony Ricketts be 'marking' Byron Walton on the 16th or the other way around as it was last time? (One would have had more sympathy for the Yeovil defender over Byron's outrageous challenge in

the GMAC game if we hadn't already witnessed Rickett's ill-tempered attempts to intimidate West, Walton & Co. in the league match at Huish.

Being absent from the F A Cup 1st Round, we instead had to console ourselves with a 5-0 demolition of Hendon in the league. Important though the points are to us, we can't pretend we didn't feel some envy of those clubs enjoying the atmosphere of the Cup that afternoon. That said, the F A Cup can be a big let-down at any stage - dear Aylesbury United found themselves drawn away to Bath City and unfortunately suffered the heartbreaking disappointment of conceding a last-minute winner after pulling back a 2 goal deficit. Meanwhile, Wealdstone, those wonderful ambassadors for the friendly face of non-League football (straight from the Alex Higgins School of Patience and Diplomacy) collected their usual quota of bookings and sendings-off in 2½ games with Swansea (Sadly, 300 Stones fans - ie, all of them - suffered 2 wasted midweek trips to South Wales for a postponement and abandonment.)

In terms of our league matches, November was superbly successful and once again all credit is due to the playing staff involved. Performances have ranged from smooth and stylish to gutsy and resolute. Having trounced Hendon at Loakes Park we faced 3 very difficult away fixtures on consecutive Saturdays with Yeovil still just 2 points below us in the table. The general feeling was that if we could finish those 3 weeks still on top of the table we would be doing very well. First opponents of the 3 were Bishop's Stortford - unbeaten at home in the league and, having equalised Noel Ashford's brilliant volley, they looked capable of doing Yeovil a favour. But Stortford lost their most influential player, Ian Fergusson with a first half injury and when the Wanderers moved up a gear in the last half an hour, Stortford were left gasping. Winning easily at bottom-placed Walthamstow that afternoon, Yeovil must have been sniffing that top spot until they heard our result. As for the match at Barking 7 days later, what can I say? Usually, the only thing about going to Mayesbrook Park is leaving Mayesbrook Park, with 3 points if possible, and when the Eastenders are 3rd in the league and also unbeaten at home, it's even nicer. A floodlight failure, an injured referee, seven second-half goals and a heart-stopping, very fortunate escape for us in the 10th and final minute of injury time gave us our 8th consecutive league win (and may even have been enough to cause discussion in a private box at QPR). Incidentally, does anyone reading this happen to know if Barking had played a match on that pitch before we arrived, or do they employ someone with a plough to get a surface like that at 3 o'clock on a Saturday afternoon? As for Yeovil losing at home to Dulwich and leaving us 5 points clear at the top - you just couldn't help feeling it was going too well to last but even a much improved Hendon side could not prevent 'The Blues' from recording a 9th consecutive league win at Claremont Road. (The two new signings making their Wycombe debuts that afternoon will hopefully provide further evidence of Alan Gane's commitment to building a squad of players worthy of the Club's ambitions).

Ending that run of 3 tricky away fixtures with a 5 point lead over Yeovil at the half-way stage of the season is obviously a tremendous boost to our hopes of being in the top-spot next April, but however clichéd it sounds, there is a hell of a long way to go yet but so far, so good!

*DO THEY MEAN US?  
investigated by Steve Maguire*

We start this month with a very brief mention of the V S Rugby game, a result described in a number of papers as the shock of the round. This was the general theme of a piece in the Birmingham Sports Argus, although they seem to have re-located Wycombe into North London. I'm not sure whether this is a mistake or whether they have inside information and Wycombe District Council have found, at last, what they consider to be the ideal site for the new ground.

An interesting revelation too in the report of our win at Wokingham in the Wokingham Times, although strangely nothing was said about the state of the pitch (maybe they are used to it being so bumpy?). Town manager Roy Merryweather was not happy after the game saying *"I have just had a go at the players. There is no use saying we could have had a draw, I do not think that is an achievement....we are all choked, given the way Wycombe played, thrashing them would have been a credit to ourselves, not losing by the odd goal."* Another comment in the same report that I found equally amusing concerned the booking for the home side's Steve Aires, after a clash with Byron Walton...*"though the referee, deciding it was time for action took Aires' name, that did not appease Mr Walton who spent the final five minutes of the half persuading Aires and any other yellow shirt that came into view with all the zeal of a rabid whippet"*!! Perhaps Byron is one of those responsible for the state of Wokingham's pitch?

Yeovil, as you might expect, were quite pleased with their win here in the GMAC Cup - the Western Gazette making much of Wycombe Vice President Alan Parry's comments about their second half performance *"the best I have ever seen from a non-League club."* Interesting also to read that Yeovil consider Wycombe are no means as good as Sutton were last season, and that the growing feeling is that Slough could turn out to be Yeovil's biggest rivals for the championship.

On the subject of Slough, full-marks to their Supporters Association. In a recent programme they condemned the people who were using obscene language during our game at Wexham Park. No marks, however, for Slough manager Alan Davies (at least not for mathematics) for his statement in the current issue of Non-League Football Focus...*"we are the best supported team in the League with the exception of Yeovil."* All I can say to this remark is that our current average league gate (up to the Hendon game) is 945, if Slough can beat that then I'll go teetotal.

The Hendon home game also saw a club official go into print, the visitor's Chairman, Mr Charles Geary, who was a bit upset with the penalty awarded against his side, which led to our second goal. Stating *"there's no way that was penalty"*, Mr Geary was convinced that Neil Price *"took a dive"*. It should be interesting to see his comments on the game there last week, a match described by LBC as *"a great advertisement for the Vauxhall Opel League"* although later mentioned an ugly incident *"in which feet and fists flew"*.

Finally, it was a pity to see that there was nothing about the signing of Mark Dawber in the local press before he actually made his debut. Was it such a big secret? Surely not, as it was spotted in the Reading Evening Post on the Wednesday before the Hendon game that Wycombe had paid Woking *"a four figure fee"* for the services of a player who has already been attracting scouts from clubs such as Manchester City and Arsenal.

Brighton's sudden turn about in deciding not to sign HARROW BOROUGH's talented midfielder Mark Adams after agreeing terms and a fee was described by a top Vauxhall/Opel League manager as "Disgraceful". Adams had been offered a two year contract but three days later Alan Mullery, the Brighton Manager, arranged for his coach, former Blues player, Peter Suddaby to telephone Adams to inform him there had been a change of heart.

On the league front the 6-6 draw between Dulwich and Bognor at Champion Hill was summed up by BOGMOR REGIS Manager Jack Pearce "Afterwards I was told that Crystal Palace Manager Steve Coppell was at the game watching a defender, understandably he left after eight goals and missed the last four". Bognor, who trailed in that game 4-6 with 3 minutes left, have still only lost once this season in the league. However, they are due to play Farnborough, Wycombe (who were responsible for their only defeat), and Slough (who beat them at Nyewood Lane in an F A Cup replay during November) all at home in the league during January.

SLOUGH TOWN earnt £1,000 from Vauxhall/Opel for the second successive season for being the last VOL club to be knocked out of the F A Cup. 'The Rebels' made their exit at Swansea where former Wycombe 'keeper, Trevor Bunting earnt high praise for his performance in keeping the score down to 3-0. Bunting was signed a week earlier by Slough to cover for the recently injured Graham Cox, who ironically was injured before last season's F A Cup game with Orient, also in the Second Round.

Cropping up again in the news over the past few weeks has been the subject of ground grading in the VOL. The League reminded all clubs during November that their grounds must reach the required standard by the end of April 1987 or face relegation. Premier Division clubs must have an 'A' grading and those in the First a minimum of a 'B' grade.

Amongst those struggling to comply are BARKING who must build a section of terracing, install around 250 new seats and raise the height of their perimeter fence. The estimated cost of this exercise is £20-25,000. Travelling Wycombe supporters would have been able to judge for themselves the standard of Barking's ground last month while during January they have the chance to examine WINDSOR & ETON's ground who are also in a difficult position. They estimate they need to spend around £15,000 on perimeter fencing, a permanent fixed barrier around the pitch, new toilets and concrete terracing behind one goal. As well as being short of money, players' wages were reduced at the start of the season and 'The Royalists' do not own their ground and must seek permission from their landlords, the Crown Commissioners, before any work can start at Stag Meadow.

The Daily Telegraph reported that at least eight Premier Division clubs have so far failed to reach the required standard. CROYDON, also hosts to Wycombe during January, are almost certain to be on this list along with WORTHING and FARNBOROUGH. Worthing are currently in serious trouble with the Inland Revenue and owe around £20,000 while at Farnborough they have already began work to their main stand to obtain an 'A' grade by April.

The Football Trust recently made Safety Grants to Vauxhall/Opel League clubs; they included YEOVIL TOWN (£21,005), HITCHIN TOWN (£4,125), LETCHWORTH (£4,050) and WYCOMBE WANDERERS (£3,946). This is part of £500,000 made available to non-League clubs to meet the cost of safety work ordered by local fire and police authorities. The grant represents 75% of the approved total cost.

# SEASON BY SEASON

1956-7

SUMMARY by Steve Maguire.

The 1956/7 season was considered at the time to be the Club's best ever, with the team reaching Wembley for the first (and so far only) time, in addition to winning the league title for the second year running. The reserves also finished as league Champions and reached three cup finals, including winning the County Intermediate Cup at the first attempt.

August saw the Club embark on a pre-season tour of Switzerland although they were without prolific goalscorer Paul Bates who was winning his first International Cap with England Amateurs. The team were given encouragement in these games by a coach load of supporters who travelled out with them.

When the season started the biggest attraction was the visit of the Ugandan International XI (no Idi Amin was not in their team!) which drew a crowd of over 7,000 people and television cameras from both BBC and ITV. Another prestigious game was the visit of Spurs for the Battle of Britain Cup, which saw the First Division club, who included three first team players, beaten 3-1.

In the F A Cup, however, we bowed out at the first hurdle, going down to Kent League side Margate in a tough match watched by another big crowd (7,200). The increase in attendances caused the Club to look seriously into the possibility of levelling the pitch, but after going into some detail, the plan had to be shelved due to the cost involved in re-building facilities for spectators. The cost was estimated at £10,000.

The Amateur Cup run started with a convincing win at St Albans and already the supporters were out in force. Two trains and all available coaches in the area ferried over 2,000 people to the game, about half the gate. Big crowds again watched the wins over Clapton and Hounslow and there was also a record crowd (3,000) to see the Wanderers go down to a shock defeat in the County Cup at Didcot. The Quarter-Final tie at Ilford saw another huge Wycombe contingent in attendance with 3 train loads (500 each) and 160 coaches travelling to see a great game on a waterlogged pitch. Geoff Truett had a storming game, hitting the bar from 25 yards and going just wide with a header...from the half-way line! This form brought Geoff in line for an England Cap, but the nearest he got was as a reserve versus Scotland and he lost his chance as he turned professional with Crystal Palace at the end of the season. Len Worley played against Scotland to add to his earlier Cap versus Wales.

After overcoming Ilford, attention was focused on Highbury where the Semi-Final was staged against Corinthian Casuals. Despite being bottom of the league the Casuals put up a terrific fight, going ahead in the first minute and it looked grim for Wycombe on the hour when, with the score at 2-2, they had two players carried off injured within a minute of each other. Skipper Frank Westley bravely came back on and saw his depleted team clinch a place in the final with two late goals from Len Worley.

The Final itself was rather an anti-climax after the events at Highbury. Bishop Auckland's very experienced side proved too strong for us, and despite Frank Smith's goal the Bishops won the cup for the third year running in front of a near capacity 90,000 crowd including an estimated 30,000 from Wycombe.

Back in the league a narrow win over the Casuals on the last Saturday of the season saw us pip Woking for the title - 'The Blues' having held the top spot for the previous seven months. An end of season game in Belgium saw Frank Westley's last game before retiring while the Club accounts showed a nett profit of nearly £2,000 for the season.

Who will win the GMVC and claim the first historic place in Division Four of the Today League? With just 11 points separating the top 11 clubs the promotion place is still in fine balance. If you are a betting person then your money may be on BARNET, whose Chairman is Stan Flashman. Limited to £10 investment, Flashman, laid a

500-1 bet that Barnet and Arsenal would be top of their respective leagues during November. After watching Barnet win 3-1 at Dagenham and take over from Maidstone as leaders, the chairman heard the good news of Arsenal's 4-0 victory at Southampton that sent them to the top of the First Division and make Flashman £5,000 richer. At the start of the season he also took 33-1 on Barnet becoming champions of the GMVC. Flashman hopes to capture the services of former Ipswich and Arsenal striker Alan Sunderland who is nearing the end of his Ipswich contract.

Another 'in-form' side in the GMVC at the moment is TELFORD UNITED. Manager Stan Storton was named as the Gola Manager of the Month for October and then saw his team continue on their good run through November, including beating Burnley (3-0) and Altrincham (1-0) to reach the Third Round of the F A Cup for the third time in four seasons. The draw has placed them at home to Leeds United although the venue of the tie is still in the balance. Telford also collected the GM Vauxhall Goals Jackpot for November and have earned £1,000 for their achievement.

Runners-up in the goalscoring awards for November were SUTTON UNITED who receive £750 to add to their top award last month. Paul McKinnon marked his last game for Sutton with a goal at Frickley. The 28 year old striker had agreed personal terms with Second Division Blackburn Rovers the previous day and has now moved north in a deal which could be worth £20,000 to the Surrey club. McKinnon, who was originally a defender at Sutton and has played European football for Swedish club Malmo, scored 195 goals in 345 appearances for Sutton.

Another GMVC player to leave for the Football League is Vince Jones who left WEALDSTONE for First Division Wimbledon for a fee in excess of £10,000. Wealdstone signed the 22 year old midfielder from local football and like McKinnon had been playing football in Sweden during the summer. Jones made his debut in 'The Dons' match at Nottingham Forest.

Also through to the Third Round of the F A Cup from the GMVC are MAIDSTONE UNITED who overcame Cambridge United 1-0 in a Second Round tie at Maidstone. Maidstone's run to the Third Round, where they travel to First Division Watford, has seen them battle through four games against Southwick from the Vauxhall/Opel First Division and then two more against GMVC strugglers Welling United.

Stuart Pearson, the NORTHWICH VICTORIA Manager, was not the happiest of people before or after their league match with Maidstone at the Drill Field during November. Pearson had spent most of the week proceeding the game trying to get the game postponed as more than half of his 20 strong squad were injured or sick. The game was ordered to be played and Northwich were forced to make a desperate call for players in the crowd to come forward for a game as the team were three players short. With only ten minutes left before kick-off three Sunday League players were registered and then defied all odds by holding Maidstone to a 1-1 draw. Not a bad result considering one of the three players had just finished a pint and pork pie in the club bar. Pearson, however, was not impressed by the league's decision to play the game and described them as "Mickey Mouse".

'The Ducks', who have just resigned Paul Hackett from Wycombe, also lost their unbeaten run in the league when they lost at Kings Lynn. At home, however, they still have a 100% record and beat Kidderminster 3-2 in the GMAC Cup at Aylesbury after leading 3-0 at half-time. In the F A Trophy they face a tough away trip to Enfield in the First Round Proper on Saturday 20 December.

# MULTIPART THE MULTIPART LEAGUE

Making the headlines for the Multipart League over the past few weeks have been Chorley and Caernarfon, whose F A Cup exploits have not only earned the teams national recognition but also earned them much needed cash. The two sides made it the first time since the Alliance Premier League was formed in 1979 that the Multipart League have had two clubs through to the Second Round Proper stage of the F A Cup - even more remarkable is the fact that both clubs had fought through all the qualifying rounds.

The greatest moment in Chorley's 103 year history came when they inflicted a 3-0 hammering of the once mighty Wolves in a First Round second replay match at Bolton Wanderers' ground. Chorley forced a goalless draw with neighbours Preston North End in the next round in a game watched by 15,153 spectators with gate receipts of over £40,000 at Blackburn Rovers' ground. The replay on the artificial surface at Deepdale drew a crowd of 16,417 but the professional proved too strong - winning 5-0. Chorley stand to make around £50,000 from their nine ties this season.

Caernarfon also had a goalless draw in their Second Round tie with York City before an all-ticket 2,000 gate in Wales. However, York were given the shock of their lives when goals from Austin Salmon and Steve Craven gave the part-timers a 2-1 victory and a first ever appearance in the Third Round, where they are at home to Barnsley on Saturday 10 January 1987.

## THERE'S NO PLACE LIKE HOME

Whilst I have been supporting 'The Blues' I have been to over 60 non-League grounds but, with few exceptions, I feel that we have little to envy in terms of facilities.

One of the first grounds I visited, back in 1969, was Wokingham's. Being young and naive I thought all grounds would be a bit like ours, but that visit soon put me right. I still remember standing in their 'cowshed' as it rattled every time a train passed behind it. Standing in 'cowsheds' can also be detrimental to your health. On one occasion at Maidenhead United the ball landed on top and showered the unlucky inhabitants with rust. You could hear more coughs than at a smoking convention as people emerged with rust highlights in their hair and gasping for air.

If mountain climbing is your sport, then a visit to Dunstable in the early 70's would have been for you. At one end of the ground there was no terracing only a chalk hill rising steeply from behind the goal. You had no choice but to clamber up 20 foot of chalk which was just what was needed when Wycombe scored their first goal after 10 minutes. The ball entered the goal only to roll out under the netting which had not been properly secured. The Dunstable 'keeper craftily placed the ball for a goal-kick, however, the referee, helped by the eagle-eyed Wycombe followers, awarded the goal.

We won that F A Cup tie 4-0 and eventually went on to play Slough in the 1st Round Proper. After a draw at Loakes Park we went to the Dolphin Greyhound Stadium (where Slough used to play) for the replay. We arrived by coach at ten past seven and were horrified to see queues stretching all around the ground. There was no way that we were going to get into the ground before kick-off. In desperation I walked around the outside of the ground and discovered that you got a perfect view of the pitch from the car park. The ground was packed and many people who did get in got in late and then couldn't see very much. The crowd was 7,000 not including those outside in the car park and whatever you think of Wexham Park, watching football in (or outside) a greyhound stadium is no fun.

Now you'd think that watching football at the famous Oval (yes that Oval) would be great but I didn't think so. In the early 1970's Corinthian Casuals played their home games there. The pitch was marked out in one corner of the ground and the players came out of the pavilion and walked across the field to the pitch. It was like watching a game on a public park, even the managers had to stand on the touchline, you half expected the subs to run the line. The 'crowd' of about 200 (all Wycombe) had to stand on their seats, where there was no cover (good job it wasn't raining) and the atmosphere was non-existent. No wonder the game was poor but we did win 2-1.

So remember, whatever you think of Loakes Park, the grass isn't always greener at other grounds, indeed the grass isn't always there on other grounds.
