

It has been encouraging during the month before the release of this issue that Wycombe supporters have approached contributors CHAIRBOYS GAS to air immediate views on various subjects. For example, several people were unhappy about their treatment at Yeovil recently and we include a report in this issue. While it has also been brought to our attention that several of the troublemakers at the qame Kettering earlier this season were NOT in fact regular Wycombe supporters but were apparently approaching regular Wycombe fans to aid their cause. Luckily commonand no prevailed incidents occured.

If there is one danger in producing a supporters' magazine it is falling into the easy option of criticising players and Managers during a bad It is that trap that hopefully have not yet fallen into. Usually the reasons for a bad run are far deeper than the playing side of things but they very rarely surface due to poor communciations and false rumours. There are times, however, especially during spells that supporters are criticised for their baracking of the players. You pay your money and say what you like, is the easy answer but when derogatory comments overheard by the player they can damage confidence in all but the most hardened of players.

But players shouldn't be beyond criticism. Gesturing to the crowd following an overheard comment not only solves nothing but can also be taken the wrong way by an innocent party. Similarly clapping the fans after an away or home win is easy, but after a defeat it takes a bit more effort but can gain far more respect. Perhaps there could be a little more tolerance from both sides in the future.

INSIDE INFORMATION

- I Jim Kelman's search for added firepower up front culminated in the signing of Brighton striker Martin Lambert for £15,000 in November. With money in short supply due to the move to the new ground, this is Wycombe's first major signing of the season. Lambert made his debut in the game at Yeovil but suffered a double fracture of the nose in the 2-1 home defeat to Merthyr the following Tuesday and missed the home draw with Northwich Victoria. During November the Club also made an offer for Aldershot's "unsettled" midfielder Glen Burvill who is currently on a weekly contract at the Fourth Division club. Aldershot were apparently unimpressed with the offer for a player they rate at "six figures". Jim Kelman was also involved in negotiations with Barrow England Semi-Pro midfielder Kenny Lowe has moved to the Wycombe area on a temporary basis for work reasons but was unable to sign for Wycombe due to his "imminent return North". Wycombe have apparently made three enquiries about Lowe this season.
- Injury problems increased during November with Glyn Creaser out for a month following a fractured toe in the game at Yeovil. To cover in the absence of Creaser, 19 year old Ricky Pearson has been signed on a month's loan from Gillingham. Martin Blacker and David Gumbs are also still out injured while Nicky Evans, although now playing, is still receiving treatment for his knee injury.
- Wycombe begin this season's F A Trophy campaign with a home tie with Vauxhall League Division One side Metropolitan Police on Saturday 13th January 1990.
- In the Berks & Bucks Senior Cup Wycombe have been drawn away to Flackwell Heath the tie due to take place at Wilks Park on Tuesday 9th January, K.O. 7.30pm.

- Amongst the many rumoured departures, came the sudden movement of long serving 'keeper Gary Lester to Slough Town. Gary ended an almost exact ten year spell at Wycombe, taking in just over 500 First Team appearances, with a 'free transfer' move to Wexham Park. Second choice 'keeper at Loakes Park now becomes Andy Poole, the ex-Nuneaton Borough and Northampton Town 'keeper. He was staned in November and will also act as a goal-keeping coach.
- Wycombe won their first piece of silverware for the season when they collected the 'Charlie Gregory Cup' by beating Ruislip Manor 6-0 at Grosvenor Vale on December 11th. The game, arranged as part of Dave Carroll's move to Wycombe from Ruislip, received absolutely publicity (press or programme) in the Wycombe area, despite the fact that the game had been arranged two months previous. The 6-0 win came courtesy of goals from Mark West (2), Dave Carroll (2), Martin Lambert and Steve Guppy. attendance was about 100.
- Making his Wycombe debut in the game at Ruslip was on loan Gillingham defender Ricky Pearson. He made his full debut in the 1-0 home victory over Barnet where he was marking Andrew Clarke.
- The Club have reverted back to their traditional change colours of red this season. Wycombe last used red as their change colours in the early 1970's before changing to yellow.

Behind the Goal:

HUMOUR

One of the few good points about our poor form leading up to Christmas, was that it was again evident that as football supporters we still have the ability to endure defeat with a laugh (although it's a pity that not everyone could do the same). It was amusing to read a Mail on Sunday report on Chelsea's 5-2 home defeat to Wimbledon where the reporter had stood on the Shed terrace and had been impressed at the good humour with which the "notorious" Chelsea supporters had watched the game. The reporter seemed genuinely surprised that fans had joked amongst themselves, mainly ridiculing themselves and ineptitude of their own team rather than abusing the opposition.

At Boston, for example, within seconds of their second goal hitting the back of John Granville's net, choruses of "Sack the Board" and "Marlow, Marlow, here we come" could be heard from a section of the Wycombe contingent behind the goal. Regrettably a few other Wanderers fans evidently lacked the sense of humour (and intelligence) obviously took the singing deadly serious. I doubt very much that the few Directors who were present actually heard the singing, and I'm sure they wouldn't care much even if they did. Equaliy I doubt whether the singers really blame the conceeding of a goal on people sitting 100 yards away in the stand, nor, I suspect do they even believe there is anyone with the power to suddenly decide to "5ack the Board". As for the "Marlow, Marlow, here we come", I'd thought it pretty obvious that this must be a reference to the prospect of playing Martow if we get relegated this season. Strange, then that they should receive a response from certain intellectuals of "Yes, go and support Marlow then!" Jim Kelman recently remarked in his programme notes that "it be a long, hard winter". would

Personally, I don't mind much if it is a long, hard winter but I would mind if it was a long, hard, humourless one. Anyone who objects to a bit of piss-taking and winding-up on the terraces (and in this column for that matter) could surely find a nice funeral reception to liven up.

SMELL

More serious problems were Yeovil two weeks evidence at earlier. Yeovil Town's Huish ground is in its farewell season and it is clear that visiting fans from many Conference clubs will not mourn its passing, having to be segregated in a section of terracing disgracefully inadequate with regard to toilet and refreshment facilties. As for the Yeovil police, for all their heavy numbers and tactics, if it is beyond them to apply a little commonsense in monitoring the activities of 20 or so youngsters who stick out like a sore thumb in the Yeovil crowd, congregating during the game in one particular area of the ground and hanging around on street corners afterwards, then God help them if Yeovil ever do gain League status. I can see it now _ "No you cannot come in the away end sir, not only can I smell alcohol on your breath but I also have reason to believe you've been eating Meanwhile 100 yards down the road an away fan is hung, drawn and quartered. Funny old game!

BRAWLING

Well, I must say my main concern whenever I go to spectate at a match of Association Football these days, is that I shall not have to witness any of this horrid brawling between players like which I have read about in the jolly old national press. I suspect all football fans are just the same, and I expect that in the pubs and bars all over the country at Saturday lunchtimes there are people asking "well, do you think we'll win today?" and the reply they would undoubtedly receive

would be "Yes fellow supporter but more importantly I do hope our players do behave themselves in a gentlementy manner. Now pray do purchase us another glass of ale". Or, on the other hand, maybe not. the sort of people (journalists?) that quard our nations morals and who have recently bored the pants off us all with their latest phoney cause for concern, namely players "brawling" as at Arsenal v Norwich, are just completely out of touch with the real world that their readers live in, even if they don't. For days after the Highbury fracas and a similar incident at West Ham the following week, the sportswriters screamed in unison about "the new disease threatening to kill the game", to the point where the F A felt obliged to take some action and fine both clubs. Then you actually see the incident on TV and you say "is that it?" Well, this may sound complacent, but if that sort of thing is currently the biggest problem facing the game of football then I can't say I'm losing a great deal of sleep over it. Rarely is a fist raised, yet alone any punches Aimost always the confrontation looks more dramatic than it really is because of the number of players who rush in purely to pull their colleagues away, and if the authorities were seriously intent on limiting these occasional bust-ups I would suggest they issue clear instructions to Clubs that players should not try to help in this way. Often these socalled "brawls" consist of 2 or 3 players threatening each verbally while a dozen others try to intervene; it makes a small incident look over-dramatic and doesn't help anyone. Except the news hounds, that is.

CONFESSIONS FROM THE TANNOY BOX

Anyway back to the heart rending topics that I was rambling on about last issue, like for instance what music should be played over the 'tannoy' at Loakes Park when our boys take the field. Do you regret the passing of the 'Dambusters Theme' or do you prefer the Official Colourbox World Cup Theme?

Why not let us know what you think? All votes for the Dambusters Theme will however be put straight into the nearest rubbish bin because I'm afraid it's me on the tannoy and it was my totally undemocratic decision that the Dambusters being played as a football team took the field in 1989 was about appropriate as the theme from the Archers. Actually since the change was made the few comments I have received have mainly been in favour of the new theme, though without some exceptions. surprisingly perhaps it seems that generally the older generation are more in favour of retaining the Dambusters whereas at least, ooh, certainly as many as 2 or 3 people have wanted to know what the new music is called and where they can get a copy. It was in fact anything but 'official' and was recorded in 1986 by a group called Colourbox. While we're on the subject of Tannoy Trivia, I may as well mention that the instrumental usually played 15 minutes before kick-off, immediately prior to the team changes, is called 'The Liquidator' and is by the Harry J All Stars, recorded in Jamaica and reached No 9 in the UK charts in 1969. The reason for playing this is even more obscure and personal. My earliest football memories are from my Dad taking me to Stamford Bridge in the early 70's to see Chelsea. For some perculiar reason the DJ always played this record and the Chelsea fans in The Shed always chanted 'Chelsea' at one particular point in the tune. was when the previous Loakes Park 'Tannoy Man', Andy Reston, left to report on the fortunes of Luton Town for BBC Radio Bedford and noone came forward to take over, that I was asked to do the job. Which, incidentally, I didn't really because I'd never had the slightest desire to spend my spare time talking into a microphone, neither did I have have any particular talent for it (as you've probably all noticed) but one thing did appeal to me - I could play the Liquidator! And I'm still doing it now - you must be sick of it! Bye, bye everybody, Bye, bye.


All Wycombe fans will hopefully agree that we have had to put up with listening to the abuse of black players from our own and the opposing teams' sub-normals for far too long (are you listening Boston, Darlington, Gravesend, Macclesfield, Runcorn, Yeovil, etc?).

The most positive aspects of the increased crowds at Loakes Park over the last year or so has been the presence at long last of some new supporters of West Indian and Asian origin. Although extremely welcome, their numbers are pitifully few when you consider the percentage of the High Wycombe population that they represent. Of course, the tragic fact is that their is little hope of attracting more or retaining these newly found when the supporters continue to make their presence felt and thus potentially making the ground a no-go area for all but National Front sympathizers.

Wycombe Wanderers F C's admirable efforts to court the local community will amount to nothing unless ALL racial and social sections of the town's public (not just the white middle/upper class ABC 1's with lots of money to spend) are actively encouraged by the Club to attend matches and/or use their facilities.

Well what can be done to purge Loakes Park of these racists? It is not merely enough that the Club condemn them via the match programme (although this would be a start). Racial abuse, as well as being discraceful in a so-called civilised society, is also against the law and it is high time that the Police and Stewards seeked out and arrested or ejected the offenders. The Club, in turn, should then ban them from ever rearing their ugly heads again on their property.

Supporters also have a great responsibility to isolate the racists, by shouting them down and reporting them whenever possible. After all they only thrive in a crowd due to others apathy to disagree with them. Nothing less must take place if Wycombe Wanderers F C really intends to become a truely credible asset to the local community.



HUISH YOU WERE HERE

For the vast majority of the 200 or so Wycombe fans who travelled to Huish on 25th November, the day will not be remembered for the fact that all of the 6 goals in the 4-2 defeat came in a 16 minute spell, or the fact that it could be their last ever visit to Huish or even the fact that Wycombe played in all red (does blue really clash with with green and white?). It will, however, be remembered yet again for the poor treatment and facilities for away supporters.

It has been widely publicised that during the past year that Yeovil have introduced new ground regulations. Where, in the main, these regulations represent positive measures towards eradicating trouble, their interpretation can also provide confusion.

Several Wycombe fans had their day throughly spoilt by unnecessary and/or incomplete measures, coupled with facilities that would make a concentration camp look pleasant — their only crime being that they had come to enjoy themselves amongst a few friends.

Approaching the turnstiles (marked clearly for away supporters) Wycombe supporters were subjected to random searching. In general terms this meant that if you didn't fit the police's identikit picture of the paragon of society you were asked to answer for it. A small, but significant, number of Wycombe been drinking and were subsequently refused admission if the answer was not to the tiking of the P.C.

prominently Although not Yeovil's displayed, Regulations state "The Club reserves the right to prosecute or to eject or to cause to be ejected any person within the Club premises ...being drunk or under the influence of alchohol or drugs to any degree." is a question interpretation and the Club appeared to be more than willing to allow visitors to use their bar facilities before the game. A sure case of taking with one hand and turning

away with the other. Even more ludicrous though was that on refusal of entry to the 'away' end, access could be easiably obtained at the 'home' end - surely the ideal place for anyone wishing to cause trouble - and to complete the farce once in the 'home' end, some Wycombe fans then gained entry to the 'away' end thanks to a friendly steward controlling the gate at the point of segregation.

It is not unreasonable that when there is segregation, most fans wish to stand or sit amongst their fellow supporters and friends. Not that the experience of the 'away' end is pleasant. The gents toilet was like something out of the First World War, whilst the ladies toilets were located in the main stand, thus requiring yet another initiative test to be passed before entry. Catering facilities consisted of a tray of pasties, crisps and tea that dissapeared shortly after kick-off. A police officer was heard to comment to the sellers that there were Wycombe fans complaining at the facilities, the reply was "well they'll have to wait to the get home". Thankfully they had a change of mind near the end of the game and returned with back-up supplies.

Following the final whistle, Wycombe fans in the away end were let out in single file "for your own safety" and when someone commented "haven't you heard of Hillsborough?", the reply from the officer "No, I don't like football". Once outside in the fading light, the streets were very poorly policed and there was at least one report of a Wycombe supporter being attacked shortly after the game – resulting hospital detainment for the night and the Wycombe team coach was also attacked, thankfully with no injuries resulting. Again all facts emphasising that measures inside the ground have little bearing on incidents outside.

We understand that a few Wycombe supporters have complained to the League about their treatment. The message is, make your feelings known, we're here if you want us.

It's the long trip to BARROW on Saturday 20th January. Despite all the talk of future ground sharing with the local rugby team, Barrow Football Club will remain the sole users of Holker Street for foreseeable future. Talks between the two parties have broken down and as a result the £1.5million redevelopment of Holker Street has deferred. With debts £250,000, the Club have put their Bluebird Social Club on the market and are hoping to receive between £100,000 and £120,000 from its sale. In addition, a 'Raising the Roof' appeal has been launched by a local supporter with £20,000 the target set to re-roof the cover on the Popular side of the ground.

Saturday 3rd February's trip to FISHER ATHLETIC, now with Mike Bailey in charge following Big Mal's departure, will be rearranged if either Club make it through the First Round of the F A Trophy on 13th. Bailey January previously in charge at Charlton, and Wolves but will Brighton perform a miracle if he keeps Fisher in the Conference for next season.

Wycombe are due to make their first ever visit to Penydarren Park on Saturday 10th February for the clash with MERTHYR Conference TYDFIL. Midfielder Kevin Rogers, who cracked his shin bone in the 2-1 victory at Wycombe, will be out of action for the rest of the Manager Lyn Jones signed season. Unfortunately, Sahara efforts. all it's despite publication is no exception.

It includes all the standard info on Clubs, such as ground capacity, admission prices, Club colours, etc, but ground directions consist annoying one or two those efforts, whereas the most useful item in any guide would be a map of the area around the ground. nearest this effort comes is one of those obligatory maps of the country which has Wycombe about 20 miles north of Barnet as one of many anomalies.



1959/60

SUMMARY by Paul Lewis

Prior to the commencement of the 1959/60 season the Club completed improvement work at the 'Hospital' end of the ground. The work, funded by the Supporters' Club, consisted of additional terracing with concrete kerbs and tarmac and was finished ready for the start of the season. At the Club's AGM held at High Wycombe Town Hall before a packed audience, the suggestion was also made to level the pitch but the high cost involved.

President, Wanderers John Timberlake, also said at the AGM that the Club's policy was to encourage local talent and it was decided to allocate special nights coaching of promising the youngsters by team coach Sid Cann. Season Tickets cost 30/- (£1.50) for men, 20/- (£1) for Ladies and 7/6 (37%p) for children. The entrance fee of 1/- (5p) held by the Club for many years, went up to 1/3 at the start of the 1958/59 season and helped produce a profit of £778 and further increase for the new season, to 1/6, was explained by Secretary Bill Hayter who said in the Bucks Free Press in August 1959 "There is a terrific amount of work to be done to improve ground amenities of the benefit supporters....hitherto we have been unable to do this work because of lack of cash. We have put up gate charges to help the work."

On the football side before the start of the season Michael Wicks, a member of Wycombe's 1957 Amateur Cup Final side, joined Hendon after having his career interupted with cartilage trouble. Meanwhile Len Worley had signed Amateur forms with Tottenham Hotspur but continued to train at Loakes Parks. New signings for the Wanderers included Michael Brown who rejoined from Slough Town and Peter James who signed from Abingdon.

began well with The season League newcomers at Maidstone United and by the end of the first 12 Isthmian League games the Wanderers were top of of 2 points ahead League, Kingstonian. Meanwhile in the F A Cup Oxford City were dismissed in the 4th Qualifying Round before a 5.994 crowd at Loakes Park. came despite the fact that Wycombe had to play in their change colours of red shirts and white shorts after losing the toss for choice shirts. Another big crowd of nearly 8,000 saw Wisbech Town beaten in the following round to earn the first Wanderers their ever in the Second Round appearance Proper.

The Second Round draw paired the Wanderers away to Fourth Division Watford who had beaten Cheltenham Town 3-0 at Vicarage Road in the previous round. The build-up for the game saw BBC cameras visit Loakes Park the Thursday evening before the game. The news item was shown the following night on the 'Town and Around' programme More than 8,000 Wycombe fans travelled to Vicarage Road where the kick-off had been brought forward to 2.15pm as the Club declined the offer to play second half under floodlights. were no shocks, however, as the professionals went through by goals to 1 before a crowd of 23,907, more than double Watford's average gate.

days of These were the 'Selection Committee' and the Monday following the game at Watford an anounomous petition was sent to the demanding Đ. public committee statement on the selection policy. also received numerous The Club letters on the subject.

Wycombe were still top of the League in January but not even the return of Len Worley could prevent a First Round Amateur Cup exit at Hounslow Town.

February saw the Club's biggest ever Isthmian League win at Loakes Park when ten goals without reply were put past Ilford. Paul Bates and Peter James both got hat—tricks and Bates went on to become top scorer for the season with 32 goals.

Visits to the 'East End' Isthmian sides resulted in vital points dropped for the Wanderers although over the Easter holiday the First Team picked up two trophies. The first was in the Berks & Bucks Final at Reading where Maidenhead United were beaten before a 5,358 crowd, while two days later Oxford City were beaten to collect the Amateur Football Alliance Trophy in Wycombe's first ever entry.

in an alcoholinduced state n.F patriotism that a small group of Wycombe supporters decided travel to Poland England's final World Cup qualifying match in Chorzow. For security reasons we can't reveal their although names SIMON WILDE and **GEOFF** HUTCHINSON take up this story.

Having ascertained that Colin Moynihan was to vet all would-be travellers, we adopted suitable pseudonyms and obtained falsified passports to ensure that we received our Polish visas.

We had opted for the three day coach tour rather than flying (because we're incredibly stingy) and our journey commenced at 5.30am on the Tuesday morning, 10th October, from High Wycombe. After joining the main coach in London we arrived at Dover by 9.30am in preparation for the ferry crossing.

We were advised to eat well on the ferry, since this would be our tast 'decent' meal for some time they don't have MacDonalds' in Poland!

After this we faced the daunting prospect of a 20 hour coach trip with only one stop in West Germany before reaching Poland. By the time the East German border was reached at midnight we were all shattered but we had to stay awake, however, to face the silent interegation of the German border guard's stare as he perused our passport photos. After a lengthy delay and having satisfied this humourless individual that we were who we claimed to be, we proceeded through East Germany to Poland where the same ritual was faced.

It was now early Wednesday morning and we were able to sample the delights of the Polish countryside, which resembled Runcorn on a rainy day.

Having been promised a breakfast of raw fish in jelly by our courier — a Barry Fry lookalike — we were pleasantly surprised to encounter a decidedly edible feast of bread, meats and cheeses once we finally reached the hotel.

After freshening up, we set off for Chorzow, a suburb of Katowice, where the match was due to played. We stopped at lunchtime at a Pub. This consisted of a small oblong room with a few tables and chairs and not being too fluent in Polish it took a few minutes for us to determine how much a pint of beer cost. Handing over a 5000 Zloty note — our cheapest form of currency — we were provided with seven pints of beer. 5000 Zloty is 50 pence! It would have been fine if it had been drinkable.

We arrived at the stadium at 3pm and had time to walk its circumference before the kick-off at 5.00pm. As you'll probably know, the match was awful but you only had to sit through it, we had to stand on a freezing, uncovered Polish terrace being rained on.

Having survived the Polish onstaught, England attained the draw they required and we returned to our coach content in the knowledge that 'the lads' would be in Italy.

The Polish fans, however, were nutters and they ambushed the first English coach to leave the stadium and proceeded to smash every window on it. Subsequently, we received a police escort, sorry Skoda escort, to our hotel from where we commenced our homebound journey.

We were told by the guard at the Polish border that our progress through to East Germany would be far swifter if we gave him a momento from 'The West'. A Portsmouth supporter on the coach duely volunteered his Pompey shirt and we were on our way — some people are so easily pleased.

Our three day trip was completed at 12.30am on Friday morning, 13th October, when we were deported in London to make our way back home.

YEAL CUPEP

As the new ground progresses at a steady rate, the major news item regarding the site has been the refusal of permission by the local council of the proposed training pitch. The proposal was for an artificial pitch adjacent to the main ground but the plans received the 'thumbs down' at the planning meeting on 15th November 1989.

The proposal involves the creation of a full-sized floodlit artificial pitch to the north and 10 metres above the level of the pitch already laid at Hillbottom Road. The Club offered the following benefits in support of the proposal;

1. The proposal is to replace a facility to be lost at Loakes Park.

 There will be no additional requirements for parking as the use of the stadium and training pitch will not conflict.

3. The pitch will cater for mainly football and hockey activities but will also provide a multi-use area for the development of a community programme.

4. The facility will be used in the evenings, weekends and holiday periods and it is hoped that local schools will also use the area in mid-week. Some 40-50 hours of activity per week are envisaged in the early stages of the scheme.

Ward Councillor comments came from Councillor A D Green who was concerned at the impact on the locality which "could be markedly increased" Councillor V A Letheren did not object to the scheme but was "concerned about further use of Green Belt for a football facility", while Councillor A M Robinson supported the application.

Additional commemnts came from the Southern Region Sports Council who fully supported the proposal. However, The Chief Leisure Services objected due to the "deleterious effect on views from the public footpath." The Booker Common and Woods Protection Society, The High Wycombe Society and The Chiltern Society also all objected on the

grounds of "further encroachment into Green Belt and Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty". The point was also made that the current stadium at Hillbottom Road was granted on appeal as a direct result of the needs of the Hospital for developent on Loakes Park.

There is little mileage to be gained in discussing the merits of an artificial pitch additional community use. It should be obvious to everyone that a property organised and funded facility would be of tremendous benefit to the community and the Unfortunately local Councillors have to seen to be supporting their local residents as well as the local community, thus the unhappy compromise for the Club is that by a marginal decision the plans were

ΙŁ summer i sed the was in Council's report that "In opinion of the Planning Local Authority the proposal would result in an intrusive form of development on an elevated and prominent site which would urbanise countryside on the edge of built-up area. In consequence, the proposal would detract from the character and appearance of Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and conflict with local policy."

If the Club have any serious intentions for the proposal they will appeal against the decision. Modifications to the plans may be required although any further lowering of the training pitch level would be a costly exercise and would require additional funding. Bearing in mind the close proximity Sands Industrial estate. sponsorship maybe possible with companies who wish to use the facility. At present there is no great urgency in the construction of the surface as the move to the new ground next Autumn should take priority but the idea should be carried through to provide the Club with a solid structure for the future.


Finally, my ten hopes for the Nineties:
